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The Ordinary God

Many people are returning to work, chores, and family responsibilities this week. The bright lights of Christmas are fading, giving way to the return of ordinary daily life. This is a good time for us to remember that the reality that Christmas celebrates—God coming to us in the life of Jesus—is not meant only for special occasions and late-December celebrations. In fact, ordinary life is where it matters most.

Today the church celebrates the moment in Jesus' infancy when his family circumcised him and named him "Jesus" according to the instruction of the angel Gabriel (Luke 1:31). Historians tell us that "Jesus" was a fairly common name, as were "Mary" and "Joseph." The circumstances of Jesus' birth were humble and anonymous, witnessed by livestock and shepherds. Casual outside observers would have seen nothing special at all in the birth of the Son of God.

In today's gospel, we learn that God chooses to enter the ordinary. The same is true about our lives. The daily grind of our work and family life may not always seem stimulating or significant to us. At times, it may even appear that no one notices what we do, or that our small contribution does not matter in the great scheme of things. Magazines and news outlets glorify fame and notoriety, suggesting that only those things and people that get airtime really matter. But in God's eyes, our ordinariness is not at all problematic. Quite the contrary, it makes us perfect candidates for God's most significant mission, to "go in peace" and serve others in Christ's name. This is not always glorious work. It may not ever be recognized. But our words of love, our caring actions, our little ways of doing justice or sharing joy—these are the very deeds of God, performed by our hands. Through our ordinary lives, Jesus is being birthed again. We are practicing Christmas.

Eucharistic Prayer

P You are indeed holy, O God, the fountain of all holiness; you bring light from darkness, life from death, speech from silence. We worship you for our lives and for the world you give us. We thank you for the new world to come and for the love that will rule all in all. We praise you for the grace shown to Israel, your chosen, the people of your promise: the rescue from Egypt, the gift of the promised land, the memory of the ancestors, the homecoming from exile, and the prophets' words that will not be in vain. In all this we bless you for your only-begotten Son, who fulfilled and will fulfill all your promises.

In the night in which he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus took bread, and gave thanks; He broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take and eat; this is my body, given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me.

Again, after supper, he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink, saying: This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin. Do this for the remembrance of me.

For as often as we eat of this bread and drink from this cup, we proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.



P Therefore, O God, with this bread and cup we remember the incarnation of your Son: his human birth and the covenant he made with us. We remember the sacrifice of his life: his eating with outcasts and sinners, and his acceptance of death. But chiefly we remember his rising from the tomb, his ascension to the seat of power, and his sending of the holy and life-giving Spirit. We cry out for the resurrection of our lives, when Christ will come again in beauty and power to share with us the great and promised feast.



P Send now, we pray, your Holy Spirit, that we and all who share in this bread and cup may be united in the fellowship of the Holy Spirit, may enter the fullness of the kingdom of heaven, and may receive our inheritance with all your saints in light.



P Join our prayers with those of your servants of every time and every place, and unite them with the ceaseless petitions of our great high priest until he comes as victorious Lord of all. Through him, with him, in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honor and glory is yours, almighty Father, now and forever.


