

### Candle colors. Do they really matter?

Vivid images on our cell phones and blazing digital billboards have all but blinded us to the effect of color. We also forget how hard it was to *make* color. Today we click a button to add brilliance to our PowerPoint presentations, bulletins, newsletters and worship folders. Our ancestors crushed berries, seeped nut shells, and pulverized minerals to make dyes for their colors.

Only the affluent could afford color, starting with dyes for fabrics. The wealthy were able to commission colorful illustrations in their books. The cost of paint on an artist's palette could be prohibitive, too, unless someone rich sponsored the painting or fresco. Later, when the printing press became the technology of choice in the late 15th century, thanks to Martin Luther, the technological challenges of color printing were challenging. Color, in short, was a luxury for a very long time.

The traditional color for Advent was violet. It's okay to call it purple -1 do too. Technically violet has its own spectrum on the color wheel, while purple is a composite color made of red and blue, but many an eye will confuse violet and purple.



One sees violet far more during Advent than blue. If you're thinking, "Isn't that the color for Lent?" you are absolutely right. Violet is the liturgical color for a season of prayer, fasting, and penance. And Advent historically has been a penitential season, in spite of the festive Christmas parties all around us.

Yet, Lutherans for over 100 years have celebrated Advent as a time of **hope** and **preparation** for the promised celebration of God's presence among us. Centuries ago, around the fifth century, Sweden used **blue** for Advent. The Advent color of blue is known as the Marian color because of its association with the Virgin Mary. Look at any painting of the Madonna from the Middle Ages on, and you're likely to find Mary wearing a blue garment of some sort.

**The color blue stands for hope.** Forty-five years ago, the Lutheran Church in the United States officially changed its color for Advent to blue to celebrate the hope that we have during the time of Advent. It really does matter what color we use, because it focuses us on what we are actually doing as a people of God. Here's to our Advent hope and our ability to never give up hope in the one who surrounds us and gives us an abundance of love. Let us celebrate the one who gives us hope in our times of hopelessness – Jesus Christ. **Pastor** Kew +
