On this day the Christian community gathers to share in the holy supper Christ gave the church to reveal his unfailing love for the human family. In the actions of this liturgy, Christ demonstrates this love by speaking his faithful word, washing our feet, and giving us his body and blood. From this gathering we are sent to continue these actions in daily life: to serve those in need, to offer mercy, to feed those who are hungry.

This first liturgy of the Three Days has no ending; it continues with the worship of Good Friday and concludes with the Celebration of Easter.

Together the Three Days proclaim the mystery of our faith: Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

GATHERING

The Holy Spirit gathers us together as the people of God

In this Lenten season we have heard our Lord's call to intensify our struggle against sin, death, and the devil –all that keeps us from loving God and each other. This is the struggle to which we were committed at Baptism; God's forgiveness and the power of the Spirit to amend our live and continue to be with us because of God's love for each and every one of us in Christ Jesus, our Savior. Within the community of the Church, God never wearies of giving peace and new life. In the words of absolution, we receive forgiveness of our sins from God. This absolution we should never doubt, but firmly believe that our sins are forgiven before God in heaven, for the forgiveness of our sins comes to us in the name and by the command of our Lord Jesus Christ. We who receive God's love in Jesus Christ are called to love one another, to be servants to each other as Jesus became our servant and to love the world.

It is however, in the Holy Communion that the members of Christ's body participate most intimately in Christ's love. Remembering our Jesus' last supper with his disciples, we eat the bread and share the cup of this meal. Together we receive the gift of Jesus and participate in that new covenant which makes us one with God. The Eucharist is the promise of the great banquet we will share with all the faithful when our Christ Jesus returns, and claims us in God's eternal kingdom. We share in prayer and support of one another, as the body of Christ.

WORD

God's Word is proclaimed in Scripture reading, preaching, and song

THE FIRST READING Exodus 12:1-14

Israel remembered its deliverance from slavery in Egypt by celebrating the festival of Passover. This festival featured the Passover lamb, whose blood was used as a sign to protect God's people from the threat of death. The early church described the Lord's supper using imagery from the Passover, especially in portraying Jesus as the lamb who delivers God's people from sin and death.

L A reading from **Exodus**:


¹The LORD said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt: ²This month shall mark for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. ³Tell the whole congregation of Israel that on the tenth of this month they are to take a lamb for each family, a lamb for each household. ⁴If a household is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join its closest neighbor in obtaining one; the lamb shall be divided in proportion to the number of people who eat of it. [⁵Your lamb shall be without blemish, a year-old male; you may take it from the sheep or from the goats. ⁶You shall keep it until the fourteenth day of this month; then the whole assembled congregation of Israel shall slaughter it at twilight. ¹They shall take some of the blood and put it on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses in which they eat it. ³They shall eat the lamb that same night; they shall eat it roasted over the fire with unleavened bread and bitter herbs. ¹Po not eat any of it raw or boiled in water, but roasted over the fire, with its head, legs, and inner organs. ¹¹⁰You shall let none of it remain until the morning; anything that remains until the morning you shall burn.]

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¹¹This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it hurriedly. It is the passover of the LORD. ¹²For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both human beings and animals; on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments: I am the LORD. ¹³The blood shall be a sign for you on the houses where you live: when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague shall destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt.

¹⁴This day shall be a day of remembrance for you. You shall celebrate it as a festival to the LORD; throughout your generations you shall observe it as a perpetual ordinance.




THE SECOND READING

In the bread and cup of the Lord's supper, we experience intimate fellowship with Christ and with one another, because it involves his body given for us and the new covenant in his blood. Faithful participation in this meal is a living proclamation of Christ's death until he comes in the future.


L A reading from **1 Corinthians**:

²³For I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took a loaf of bread, ²⁴and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." ²⁵In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." ²⁶For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

THE HOLY GOSPEL John 13:1-17, 31b-35

The story of the last supper in John's gospel recalls a remarkable event not mentioned elsewhere: Jesus performs the duty of a slave, washing the feet of his disciples and urging them to do the same for one another.

Glory to You, O Lord.

¹Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. ²The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper ³Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, ⁴got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. ⁵Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. ⁶He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" ¬Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand." ³Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." ¬Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" ¹¹Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash,

except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you." ¹¹For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, "Not all of you are clean."

¹²After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? ¹³You call me Teacher and Lord—and you are right, for that is what I am. ¹⁴So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. ¹⁵For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. ¹⁶Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. ¹⁷If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them."

^{31b} Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. ³²If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. ³³Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, 'Where I am going, you cannot come.' ³⁴I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. ³⁵By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."





What Love Means

On Maundy Thursday, a father and son make their way to a footwashing station in the church. The man kneels before his son and a basin of warm, soapy water set between them. Slowly, gently, the man begins to wash his son's bare feet and to wipe them with a towel. When the child was only a baby, the parent did something like this: washed face and knees, elbows and toes—it was part of their bath-time routine all those years ago. Now, in worship, this tender act of care awakens long-forgotten memories. The father thinks to himself, "This is what love means."

Something like it happens every day—in homes, hospitals, and long-term care facilities. In these places, caregivers wash the bodies of the elderly and the aging, those who are disabled, sick, or dying. Yet many more of us are mostly unacquainted with this kind of work. It may make us feel uncomfortable. Some may consider it menial or even "dirty." However, perhaps our discomfort owes, to a greater extent, to the fact that caring for others in this way puts us intimately in touch with the frailty of our own flesh.

Jesus, the Word made flesh, knows that he will be with his disciples only a little longer. His "new" commandment to them, "that you love one another," was hardly new at all; in fact, it dated back to God's giving of the law to ancient Israel. But when Jesus washed the disciples' feet, he was inviting them yet again into a new way of life. He did not wash their feet out of concerns for cleanliness. Instead, this tender act of care was about setting an example about the lengths to which love will go. The same love with which Jesus had loved them all along would take him all the way to the cross. On the cross, God's love meets us in all our frailty and makes known to us anew the meaning of love.

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
